January 21, 2016 — One Amazing Thing, by Chitra Banerjee Divakaruni. Selected for 2015-16 All Henrico Reads program; author will visit our area in April.

One Amazing Thing is a passionate creation about survival — and about the reasons to survive. Set in a passport and visa office in an unnamed American city; most customers and office workers have left, but nine people of varied backgrounds and nationalities remain. When an earthquake traps them together, their focus first jolts to their collective struggle to survive. The novel proves the transcendent power of stories and the meaningfulness of human expression itself as the survivors conquer their fears. Chitra Divakaruni is an award-winning,

bestselling novelist and poet, author of 14 books in all. Two of her novels have been made into movies; *One Amazing Thing* is expected to become a movie as well. She teaches creative writing at the University of Houston

February 18, 2016 (Black History Month) — The Souls of Black Folk, by W.E.B. DuBois (1903)

One of the most influential books ever published in America, W. E. B. Du Bois's *The Souls of Black Folk* is an eloquent collection of 14 essays that describe the life, ambitions, struggles, and passions of African Americans at the transition from the 19th to the 20th Century.

March 17, 2015 (Women's History Month) — The Girls of Atomic City: The Untold Story of the Women Who Helped Win World War II, by Denise Kiernan

At the height of World War II, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, was home to 75,000 residents, consuming more electricity than New York City. But to most of the world, the town did not exist. That is, until the end of the war ... when Oak Ridge's secret was revealed. Drawing on the voices of the women who lived it — women who are now in their 80s and 90s — *The Girls of Atomic City* rescues a remarkable, forgotten chapter of American history from obscurity. Denise Kiernan captures the spirit of the times through these women: their pluck, their desire to contribute, and their enduring courage.

Allison attended Kalamazoo College and received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy with several honors and accolades. Kalamazoo College is the pre-eminent liberal arts college in Michigan, which outfits its students with the skills to navigate social issues with a focus on historical, local, and global impacts. Allison served as Editor-in-Chief of the student newspaper, *The Index*.
