# **Public Policy - Kathy Kelley Chair**

This is a very busy time of year at the General Assembly. "Since AAUW's founding our members and supporters have spoken out about policies important to women and girls. Without their voices, invaluable legislation would have never been passed. In recent years, such legislation included the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act." (from the AAUW website) It is important that we make our voices heard. I will try to keep you up to date on bills to advocate. Call, write, or email your legislators. A subject that is bringing bipartisan support is the redistricting. Virginia is one of the worse gerrymandered state in the country. Counties and cities are being broken in half or into multiple pieces to create heavily partisan districts. OneVirginia 2021 is working for a fair bipartisan redistricting.

Transparency has been a real problem in recent years. Groups like ours have worked with bipartisan support from others to influence the GA to let us know what is going on with the bills and committees.

The SJ1 ERA bill has passed the VA Senate with bipartisan support! This also has happened for the last few years. However, Del. Cole Chair of the Privileges and Elections Committee has not allowed it to see the light of day when it crosses over to the House. It is imperative that you contact him and the members of the Privileges and Election Committee to urge them to allow a vote on the floor of the House.

The Centennial Rally for Equal Rights is being held on Crossover day. It is important that you lend your support. Plan to attend the rally. Drive to 5100 Monument or 4050 Forest Hill Ave. to ride city busses together. Contact Kathy Kelley and Carol Stephens for times! Gov. McAulliffe will be in attendance and arriving in an antique car and those in period dress will be attending as well! Placards will be provided!

February 18, 2016 (Black History Month) — We'll meet at home of Katy Garnett, a newer member, to discuss The Souls of Black Folk, by W.E.B. DuBois (1903). One of the most influential books ever published in America, W. E. B. Du Bois's The Souls of Black Folk is an eloquent collection of 14 essays that describe the life, ambitions, struggles, and passions of African Americans at the transition from the 19th to the 20th Century. The first African American to receive a Ph.D. from Harvard University, Du Bois was a sociologist, historian, novelist, and activist whose astounding career spanned the nation's history from Reconstruction to the Civil Rights Movement. In The Souls of Black Folk, Du Bois argued against the conciliatory position taken by Booker T. Washington, at the time the most influential black leader in America, and called for a more radical form of aggressive protest — a strategy that would anticipate and inspire much of the activism of the 1960s. Du Bois's essays were the first to articulate many of Black America's thoughts and feelings, including the dilemma posed by the black psyche's "double consciousness," which Du Bois described as this "twoness" — an American, a Negro; two souls, two thoughts, two unreconciled strivings . . . in one dark body."

March 17, 2016 (Women's History Month) — The Girls of Atomic City: The Untold Story of the Women Who Helped Win World War II, by Denise Kiernan

At the height of World War II, Oak Ridge,

Future Reads (continued) Tennessee, was home to 75,000 residents, consuming more electricity than New York City. But to most of the world, the town did not exist. Thousands of civilians — many of them young women from small towns across the South — were recruited to this secret city, enticed by solid wages and the promise of war-ending work. Kept very much in the dark, few would ever guess the true nature of the tasks they performed each day in the hulking factories in the middle of the Appalachian Mountains. That is, until the end of the war ... when Oak Ridge's secret was revealed. Drawing on the voices of the women who lived it — women who are now in their 80s and 90s — The Girls of Atomic City rescues a remarkable, forgotten chapter of American history from obscurity. Denise Kiernan captures the spirit of the times through these women: their pluck, their desire to contribute, and their enduring courage.

# **April 21, 2016** — *The Invisible Bridge*, by Julie Orringer

Paris, 1937. Andras Lévi, a Hungarian-Jewish architecture student, arrives from Budapest with a scholarship, a single suitcase, and a mysterious letter he promised to deliver. But when he falls into a complicated relationship with the letter's recipient, he becomes privy to a secret that will alter the course of his — and his family's — history. From the small Hungarian town of Konyár to the grand opera houses of Budapest and Paris, from the lonely chill of Andras's room on the rue des Écoles to the deep and enduring connection he discovers on the rue de Sévigné, from the despair of Carpathian winter to an unimaginable life in forced labor camps and beyond, The Invisible Bridge tells the story of a love tested by disaster, of brothers whose bonds cannot be broken, of a family shattered and remade in history's darkest hour, and of the dangerous power of art in a time of war. Expertly crafted, magnificently written, emotionally haunting, and impossible to put down, The Invisible Bridge resoundingly confirms Julie Orringer's place as one of today's most vital and commanding young literary talents.
