Potluck Conversations

"One member had been in the military. She experienced discrimination in being able to work in the foreign service. No reason was ever given but women were not allowed to serve in the foreign service until they reached age 27. One [member] felt that while serving as the Teacher's Union President she would have had better respect in representing her teachers if she had been a man, but did not experience any overt discrimination. Another member at the table worked in IT and experienced being the only female in the department for a long while. She did not experience any discrimination in her field. However, she did notice that as more women started working in IT at her company that the women tended to be assigned the accounting and in-house responsibilities, while the men were more often assigned to the hardware side of the IT service and to the operation of the plant machines etc." -Carol Stephens

"As a member, I have experienced discrimination in the past as a woman:
1. When trying to get jobs in high school and college, *I was always given a typing test because it was assumed that I could only do secretarial duties*.

2. [I] could not go to the college of my choice because women weren't admitted.

3. [I] had to quit teaching at five months pregnancy because it wasn't "proper for a pregnant women to be in front of a class." As a result, I had to pay back my entire scholarship for the year, even though I only had three months left in the school year.

4. **[1]** could not buy my first car without a co-signer (because I was a woman), even though I was paying the monthly bill and my husband at the time was president of the bank!"
