Public Policy Update

We will be having voter registration again in the fall. Everyone who is registering must do the training again because our certification will be terminated on June 30. The easiest way to obtain this certification is by taking on-line training.

Please wait until after July 1st to check on the training places and schedule as it won't be available until then. Remember that if you are volunteering with someone who has the training you don't need to be trained but it helps. We will try to register voters at the Farmers Market in Forest Hill Park and at bus stops. If anyone has any other ideas please let me know. It is very important that we make sure out voices are heard. An easy way to do that is to sign up to be a two minute activist. Just go to this page and sign up. Direct phone calls and emails are best but this is an easy way to contract your legislators.

The latest from <u>OneVirginia2021</u> about gerrymandering: according to Arron Blake of the Washington Post the Supreme Court just made a major decision without actually issuing a decision.

Now the tough part – I did not plan to do Public Policy again next year so we need a volunteer to take over. I will be glad to assist but I need someone to set up voter registration, make phone calls and keep our membership informed. I do intend to go to the Women's Roundtable each Wednesday during the session and do the lobbying.

STEAM Conference a Huge Success!

After many busy hours by Laura Wimmer, Lesin Dippold, Carol Stephens and Andrew Derer (the MathScience Innovation Center Liaison) we launched STEAM ON on Wednesday, June 21st at the MSIC. Most all of the students gave her very high marks in their evaluation. We offered a variety of 50 minute workshops throughout the day, some of them were volunteers who returned again this year after presenting last year! One volunteer came from Capital One's office in NYC. Although science and math were the most popular classes that the girls took in school this year, and math was mentioned as the most challenging thing about STEAM subjects, we did not have any work-

shops that centered on math. I am hopeful that this next year with your help we will be able to attract some presenters in the math field. When asked who had encouraged them to pursue studies in STEAM subjects, the majority mentioned family members, but a number of students mentioned their teachers or their own strong desire and interest to pursue studies in STEAM. Very few students expected to be involved in other STEAM related activities/courses this summer, so I am very proud that we could offer this unique experience to so many girls. Most all of the girls (39) wanted to return next year to attend a similar workshop! The Challenger workshop led by NASA employees and Music and Science: Universal Languages led by our own Tonjia Phillips were the most popular workshops with What If Chemistry Were Beautiful and Relevant and Colorful Costume Jewelry running close behind.

We could not have had such smoothly run conference without the help of our volunteers from the Federal Reserve Bank and our members Carol Swartz, Suzanne Conrad, Kathy Kelley, Georgiana Ball, Connie Sorrell, and Barb Strohman. Thank you all!
