BOOKS: This month we'll be reading two books on related subjects: **Ecology of a Cracker Childhood**, by Janisse Ray and **Hillbilly Elegy: A Memoir of a Family and Culture in Crisis**, by J.D. Vance

In *Ecology of a Cracker Childhood*, a naturalist and nature writer explores the natural environment of her childhood in a poor but happy and self-sufficient family, and describes poetically how a small portion of our country. has changed due to economic decisions of the past century.

In *Hillbilly Elegy*, Vance, a former marine and Yale Law School graduate, gives a powerful account of growing up in a poor Rust Belt town and offers a broader, probing look at the struggles of America's white working class.

Meeting date: **November 15**Book: *Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI*, by David Grann.

Just after World War I, with automobiles becoming more and more prevalent, atrocities against Native Americans rear their ugly heads in Northeast Oklahoma. After being relegated to seemingly worthless land, the Osage Tribe suddenly finds its members growing rich as oil is discovered. Then several prominent tribal members are mysteriously murdered. When local authorities – such as they were – can't solve the crimes, they appeal to the federal government and the newly formed FBI comes to town. Nonfiction that reads like a good detective story, best-selling *Killers of the Flower Moon* has received wide praise.
