ERA Passes Senate; Enjoys Bipartisan Support

The Virginia Senate approved ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment on January 15, 2019. Seven Republicans joined all 19 Democrats, passing the resolution by a 26 to 14 vote. The

Senate resolution, introduced by Glen Sturtevant, was before the House, where it was assigned to the Privileges and Elections Committee ("P&E Committee). Chairman Delegate Cole assigned it and the House bills urging ratification of the ERA to Subcommittee #1 where he knew it would meet with certain defeat, and they were defeated.

With 81% of registered voters in Virginia favoring the General Assembly's ratification in 2019 and elections around the corner, 2019 may be the year that the Equal Rights Amendment is finally ratified. There are other options that are being explored. Stay tuned and be ready to act swiftly!

AAUW of VA Lobby Corps delivers!

On Jan. 16th members of GRAAUW along with AAUW of VA members from across the state deliver the pamphlet, *Unfinished Business*, created mostly by Patsy Quick and Sylvia Rogers, to each Senator and Delegate in the General Assembly. As we delivered them it was accepted with broad smiles by many of the receptionists at their desks. Thanks to everyone involved!

After the P & E Committee killed the ERA resolutions, support came in to VA from across the US and throughout VA. Carol Stephens received a phone call from a woman (not an AAUW member) in Virginia Beach who wanted to let us know that she had sent 38 symbolic yellow roses to Speaker Cox's office. He refused to accept them, so she rerouted them to "AAUW office". Jane Newell was surprised to receive those 38 yellow roses! Trish Wallace also received 38 yellow roses too. The Redland Branch of AAUW in California sent a letter of support to a long time advocate for passage of the ERA in VA, Neola Waller. Lee Winne wrote a beautiful letter of support to his delegate and senator in honor of Karen's long held desire for ratification of the ERA.

Karen Winne, who served as GRAAUW's Corresponding Secretary for several years, passed away on January 11 due to complications from a stroke. Karen was a long-time AAUW member, belonging to Branches around the U.S. as her husband Lee's career took them to many places, including several assignments abroad. Wherever they landed, Karen always found meaningful work for herself, often working with refugees and other immigrants stateside.

In GRAAUW, Karen was active in Book Group, Lunch Bunch, and Bridge Group as long as her health allowed. Several of us had special connections with Karen ... Dottie Vye learned that she and Karen had grown up in the same Philadelphia suburb and graduated from the same high school a few years apart. Suzanne Conrad was Karen's Midlothian neighbor and remembers her as a dear friend. Maggie King and DeAnn Lineberry connected with Karen before she came to Richmond. Maggie lived briefly in Charlottesville and looked into joining AAUW there; she spoke with Karen about membership, and when Karen came to GRAAUW several years later, she still remembered the conversation with Maggie! While Karen was living in Charlottesville, she and DeAnn worked together at the Virginia Department of Social Services in the early 2000s and Karen recruited DeAnn to AAUW, encouraging her to find a Richmond-area Branch ... which she did!

Remembering Nancy Grace Roman

We were saddened by the passing of longtime AAUW member and renowned astronomer [Nancy Grace Roman](#) last month at age 93. Affectionately known as the "mother of the Hubble" for her role in developing the Hubble Space Telescope, Roman was the first chief of astronomy in the Office of Space Science at NASA and the first woman to hold an executive position there. (And she's one of four "[Women of NASA](#)" Legos!) Thursday, February 21 – Black History Month

BOOK: *The Underground Railroad, A Novel*, by Colson Whitehead. *Winner Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award; Oprah Book Club selection.*

Cora is a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia. Life is hellish for all the slaves but especially bad for Cora. When Caesar, a recent arrival from Virginia, tells her about the Underground Railroad, they decide to take a terrifying risk and escape. Matters do not go as planned and, though they manage to find a station and head north, they are being hunted.

In Whitehead's ingenious conception, the Underground Railroad is no mere metaphor -- engineers and conductors operate a secret network of tracks and tunnels beneath the Southern soil. Like the protagonist of *Gullivers Travels*, Cora encounters different worlds at each stage of her journey – hers is an odyssey through time as well as space. As Whitehead brilliantly re-creates the unique terrors for black people in the pre-Civil War era, his narrative seamlessly weaves the saga of America from the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day.

BOOK: *The Firebrand and the First Lady: Portrait of a Friendship: Pauli Murray, Eleanor Roosevelt, and the Struggle for Social Justice*, by Patricia Bell-Scott. *Recommended by AAUW's Adelante Book Club; author is 1984–85 AAUW American Fellow*

A groundbreaking book, two decades in the works, that tells the story of how a brilliant writer-turned-activist, granddaughter of a mulatto slave, and the first lady of the U.S., whose ancestry gave her membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution, forged an enduring friendship that changed each of their lives and helped to alter the course of race and racism in America.

Pauli Murray first saw Eleanor Roosevelt in 1933, at the height of the Depression, at a government-sponsored, 200-acre camp for unemployed women where Murray was living, something the first lady had pushed her husband to set up in her effort to do what she could for working women and the poor. The first lady appeared one day unannounced, behind the wheel of her car, her secretary and a Secret Service agent her passengers. To Murray, then aged 23, Roosevelt's self-assurance was a symbol of women's independence, a symbol that endured throughout Murray's life.
